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I'd install some Dunlop Strap locks. Tying the strap to the neck will create all kinds of tuning problems since the neck is so thin, and I wouldn't want to add any stress to the neck or truss rod. The strap locks will secure your strap to the guitar and can be quickly removed by pushing the release button.
